MELBOURNE. June 23.

PARIS, June 22.

"Le Journal" says that on Monday the Allied fleets bombarded Gallipolt at the entrance to the Sea of Marmora, and immease flames sprang up in different parts of the town. It is believed that the munitions, stores, the docks and several milltary warehousen are on fire.

LONDON, June 22.
