Title Test for Discretized Normality in Ordinal Data

Version 0.2.1

Description Tests whether multivariate ordinal data may stem from discretizing a multivariate normal distribution.
The test is described by Foldnes and Grønneberg (2019) <[doi:10.1080/10705511.2019.1673168](https://doi.org/10.1080/10705511.2019.1673168)>.
In addition, an adjusted polychoric correlation estimator is provided that takes marginal knowledge into account,
as described by Grønneberg and Foldnes (2022) <[doi:10.1037/met0000495](https://doi.org/10.1037/met0000495)>.

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Description

bootTest is a bootstrap test for whether an ordinal dataset is consistent with being a discretization of a multivariate normal dataset.

Usage

Arguments

my.data	A dataset containing ordinal data. Must contain only integer values.
B	Number of bootstrap samples.
verbose	If true, bootstrap progress is printed to the console.

Value

p-value associated with the underlying normality hypothesis.

catLSadj	<i>Adjusted polychoric correlation</i>
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Description

catLSadj estimates the underlying correlations assuming bivariate normal copulas, and marginal underlying distributions as provided by the user. The output, i.e., an adjusted correlation matrix and its associated asymptotic covariance matrix, may be used to estimate ordinal factor models and structural equation models with systems such as lavaan. How to do this is shown in the example/vignette.

Usage

Arguments

data.df	A dataset containing ordinal data.
marginslist	A list of length equal to the number of columns in data.df. Each element in the list specifies a univariate marginal distribution. Each element must contain a function F, which is the univariate CDF of the marginal. It must accept vectorial input. F is assumed to be continuous, and have support on a interval, which may be all numbers. That is, a random variable X which is F distributed can take any values in an interval (which could be the set of all real numbers). In addition, elements "qF", "sd" and "support" may be included. "qF" is to be the quantile function of F. "sd" is to be the standard deviation of F. "support" is the support of the distribution of F. If "support" is not included, it is assumed to be all numbers. If qF or sd is not included, they are numerically approximated. For optimal performance, both qF and sd should be passed. If they are not provided, they will be approximated numerically, sometimes at great cost of both precision and execution speed. For all well-known univariate distributions, both qF and sd are well-known. Implementations for most quantiles are available in R, and standard deviation formulas for most distributions are available on Wikipedia.
verbose	If true, additional information is printed to screen.

Value

A list of two elements: The adjusted polychoric correlation matrix and its associated asymptotic covariance matrix.
