Methodology in Brief

YouGov interviewed 1068 registered voters who were then matched down to a sample of 1000 to produce the final dataset. The respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, education and party ID. The sampling frame is a politically representative "modeled frame" of MA adults, based upon the American Community Survey (ACS) public use microdata file, public voter file records, the 2020 Current Population Survey (CPS) Voting and Registration supplements, the 2020 National Election Pool (NEP) exit poll, and the 2020 CES surveys, including demographics and 2020 presidential vote. The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, presvote20 and ownhome. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles. The weights were then post-stratified on a four-way stratification of gender, age (4-categories), race (2-categories), and education (4-categories), to produce the registered voter weight. YouGov also provided a separate weight to estimate likely voters. Likely voter weights were post-stratified on a two-way stratification of gender and age (4-categories), using benchmarks obtained from the voter file for 2018 midterm voters. In addition, several likely voter profiles were given slightly more weight than their unlikely voter counterparts.

UMass Lowell is a public institution and releases surveys as a source of public information. We offer a complete methodology report in adherence with standards of the AAPOR Transparency Initiative, as well an extensive set of crosstabs. Question 1 on Massachusetts' ballot would amend the state constitution to establish a state income tax of 4% that would be applied to annual taxable incomes greater than \$1 million. The income level that the tax is applied to will be subject to annual adjustments based on the cost of living, like federal income-tax brackets. The money gained from this tax will go towards funding public schools, colleges, and universities, as well as public transportation, roads, and bridges. Question 2 on Massachusetts' ballot would create a law requiring dental insurance carriers to meet a minimum medical loss ratio of 83%. This ratio is the percentage of premiums spent on patient care to administrative expenses, so an 83% ratio would require that a carrier spend 83% of its premiums on patient care, rather than on administrative expenses like building leases and utilities. If the ratio is not met by the carrier, then the covered party would be required to be refunded the excess premium.
